# A YEAR OF RESILIENCE AND RECALIBRATION

**THE** financial year 2025–26 has been one of resilience and recalibration, for India's infrastructure and construction sector. ## SECTOR PERFORMANCE AND GROWTH DRIVERS

During the year, the sector continued to expand at a steady pace, with construction gross value added growth remaining robust despite temporary slowdowns caused by extended monsoons and reduced state-level capital expenditure in the early part of the year. Encouragingly, project award activity regained traction in the latter half, reflecting a broadening of opportunities beyond traditional road infrastructure. The sector today stands on the strength of a comfortable order book position.

## GLOBAL HEADWINDS AND COST PRESSURES

At the same time, the year highlighted the increasing influence of global developments on domestic infrastructure economics. Geopolitical tensions, particularly in the Middle East, have triggered volatility in energy markets, disrupted supply chains, and led to rising input costs across fuel, steel, cement, and logistics. These cascading effects have translated into greater execution uncertainties, underlining how closely global events are now intertwined with on-ground realities in India's construction sector.

## INDUSTRY CHALLENGES AND EXECUTION DISCIPLINE

Alongside these external pressures, persistent industry challenges remained. Heightened competition, especially in EPC projects, led to aggressive bidding and margin compression. Working capital management became more demanding amid tighter liquidity conditions and evolving financing norms. Rising labour costs and supply-side constraints further added to execution complexities. Together, these factors reinforced the need for disciplined bidding, prudent financial management, and operational agility across the industry.

Against this backdrop, NCC has delivered a steady performance in FY 2025–26.

Our diversified presence across key infrastructure segments—buildings, transportation, water, electrical, Irrigation, railways, and mining—has enabled us to navigate sectoral fluctuations effectively. # A New Symbol of Unity

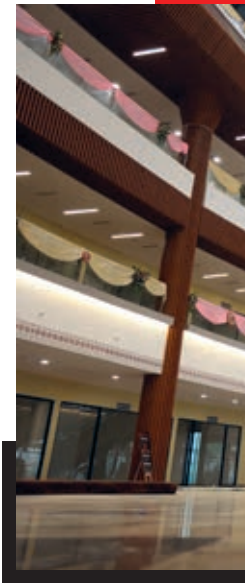
## PM Ekta Mall Unveiled in Guwahati

**I**n a significant step towards promoting national integration and celebrating India's rich cultural diversity, PM Ekta Mall (Unity Mall) at Betkuchi, Guwahati, Assam—constructed by NCC—was inaugurated by the Prime Minister Narendra Modi, on 13 March 2026. The ceremony took place in the esteemed presence of the Chief Minister of Assam, Himanta Biswa Sarma, during the Prime Minister's visit to the state.

Conceptualised by the Government of India under the visionary theme of "Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat", the PM Ekta Mall initiative aims to create a vibrant platform that brings together the diverse traditions, crafts, and unique products of India's states and union territories under one roof. The project is aligned with the Government's "Vocal for Local" campaign and supports the "One District One Product (ODOP)" initiative, thereby promoting indigenous industries and strengthening local economies.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman announced in the Budget of 2023-24 that "States will be encouraged to set up a "Unity Mall" in their state capitals, or most prominent tourism centres, or financial capitals for promotion and sale of their own ODOPS, GI products and other handicraft products, and for providing space for such products of all other States."

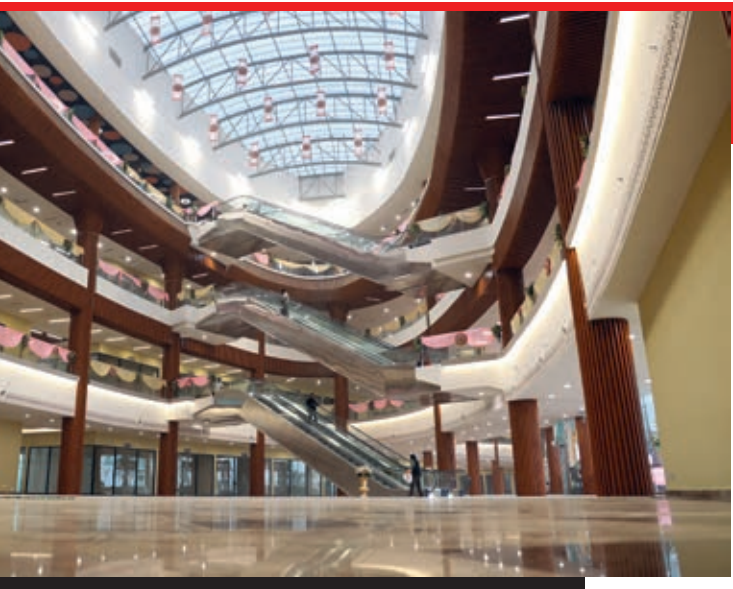
The PM Ekta Mall, the first of its kind in India under this scheme, has been thoughtfully designed as a dynamic commercial and cultural hub. It provides a dedicated space for artisans, weavers, self-help groups, and local entrepreneurs from across the country to showcase and market their products, helping preserve traditional craftsmanship while enhancing livelihood opportunities.



## The project includes:

### The Façades :

Concept of Façade is developed around two key themes: Assam's ecological and cultural identity, and the unity of India. One part draws inspiration from Assam's green landscape, especially Kaziranga National Park, using perforated panels and flowing curves inspired by tea leaves and natural terrain. The second part represents national integration through multiple engraved panels carrying the names of Indian states, symbolizing unity in diversity. A prominent bell-shaped Xorai element, rooted



in Assam's heritage, is integrated into the design as a tribute to local tradition and as a symbol of respect, gratitude, and national harmony.

### Highlights

- 35 shops representing districts of Assam, showcasing district-specific products.
- 36 shops representing States and Union Territories across India, symbolising unity in diversity.
- 34 retail outlets offering a range of commercial services.
- 14 anchor stores to enhance the mall's commercial vibrancy.
- Food courts with 35 stalls, featuring authentic Assamese and Northeastern cuisine alongside multi-cuisine options.
- Children's play area and crèche facilities, ensuring a family-friendly environment.

The choice of Guwahati as the location holds strategic importance, as it serves as the gateway to Northeast India and a major hub for commerce, culture, and connectivity. The project also highlights the rich cultural heritage of Assam, renowned for its handloom and handicrafts such as Muga, Eri, and Pat silk, along with bamboo, cane, and tea products.

From an engineering perspective, the project showcases NCC's commitment to innovation and excellence. The mall has been developed using composite structural steel construction, combining structural steel with reinforced concrete to achieve enhanced strength, durability, and efficiency. This modern approach ensures faster execution, improved seismic performance, and reduced structural weight, making it well-suited for large public infrastructure. The successful execution of this prestigious project reflects NCC Limited's expertise in delivering high-quality infrastructure that supports national initiatives and contributes to economic growth.





# Organisational Insiders

## The Hidden Strength of Infrastructure Companies

In large infrastructure organizations like NCC success is often attributed to capital, technology, and execution capabilities. However, one of the most underappreciated assets lies within—organisational insiders. These are individuals who possess deep institutional knowledge, understand ground realities, and influence outcomes beyond formal authority.

### Who are Organisational Insiders?

Organisational insiders are not necessarily senior leaders such as Coordinators at NCC. They may be:

- Long-tenured project managers
- Site engineers with local expertise
- Procurement professionals with vendor insights
- Finance personnel who understand cost leakages

What distinguishes them is their contextual intelligence—they know how things actually work, not just how they are designed to work.

### Why Insiders Matter in Infrastructure?

Infrastructure businesses operate in complex ecosystems involving:

- Regulatory approvals
- Land acquisition challenges
- Contractor dependencies
- Commodity price volatility

### In such environments, insiders:

- Anticipate risks early
- Navigate informal networks
- Prevent costly delays
- Enable faster decision-making

Their role becomes critical in bridging the gap between strategy and execution.

### Case Illustration 1: Preventing Project Delays

In a highway development project, a mid-level site engineer flagged potential resistance from local communities due to access road disruptions. While the issue was not visible in formal reports, his early intervention enabled:

- Engagement with local stakeholders
- Minor design adjustments
- Avoidance of a 3-month delay

**Insight: Insider awareness of local sentiment can be as important as technical planning.**

### Case Illustration 2: Cost Optimization in Procurement

A procurement manager with years of vendor experience identified abnormal price escalation in cement supplies during a peak construction phase. Instead of accepting market rates, he:

- Leveraged long-standing supplier relationships
- Negotiated staggered pricing
- Suggested alternate sourcing strategies

This resulted in significant cost savings without compromising timelines.

**Insight: Insider relationships and market memory can mitigate pricing risks.**

### Case Illustration 3: Risk Identification in Power Projects

In a captive power setup, an operations insider recognized inefficiencies in fuel sourcing contracts. His observations led to:

- Renegotiation of fuel linkage agreements
- Improved plant load efficiency
- Reduction in energy costs

**Insight: Operational insiders often detect inefficiencies invisible at the corporate level.**



#### LEVERAGING INSIDER ADVANTAGE

To fully benefit from organisational insiders, companies must:

- ✓ Encourage upward communication without hierarchy barriers
- ✓ Institutionalize feedback loops from site to boardroom
- ✓ Recognize and reward practical insights
- ✓ Integrate insider inputs into risk management frameworks

For infrastructure companies, organisational insiders are not just operational assets—they are strategic enablers.



In an industry where margins are tight and risks are high, leveraging insider knowledge can create a sustainable competitive advantage.

## Building Healthcare for Tomorrow

## Phase 2 redevelopment of Lokmanya Tilak Municipal General Hospital, Sion

In a significant step towards strengthening Mumbai's public healthcare infrastructure, Maharashtra Chief Minister, Devendra Fadnavis laid the foundation stone during the 'bhoomi pooja ceremony' on 27 March 2026 for Phase 2 redevelopment of Lokmanya Tilak Municipal General Hospital — a landmark project being executed by NCC.

Undertaken in collaboration with the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC), the project reflects a shared commitment to delivering free, high-quality, and modern healthcare to the citizens of Mumbai.

With an estimated project cost of ₹1,617 crore, the redevelopment will transform the hospital into a next-generation medical facility. The capacity will be expanded from 1,900 to 3,113 beds, addressing the city's growing healthcare needs. The project is slated for completion by 2030.

The scope of work includes the construction of a 15-storey main hospital building with a capacity of 2,200 beds, a

13-storey dedicated cancer care facility with 200 beds, and a 14-storey emergency services block accommodating 600 beds.

The upgraded hospital will feature more than 62 state-of-the-art operation theatres and a 14-storey Outpatient Department (OPD) building capable of handling up to 16,000 patients.

Advanced diagnostic infrastructure—including MRI, CT scan, and PET scan facilities—along with a pneumatic tube system for rapid sample transport, will further enhance operational efficiency.

For NCC, this project stands as another testament to its expertise in delivering large-scale, complex healthcare infrastructure. With projects like these,

NCC continues to contribute meaningfully to nation-building—creating infrastructure that not only serves today's needs but also defines the future of public healthcare.

## LDA Flyover–Daliganj inaugurated

Lucknow witnessed a moment of pride and progress on 13 March 2026, as a key stretch of the LDA Flyover–Daliganj Project—from Rotary-1 to Rotary-2—was formally inaugurated, marking a significant milestone in the city's evolving urban landscape.

The inauguration ceremony was graced by the Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh, Yogi Adityanath, and the Minister of Defence, Government of India, Rajnath Singh, whose presence underscored the importance of this infrastructure achievement for both the state and the nation.

The completed works include 343 piles, 70 pile caps, 67 piers, 3 abutment walls, and 62 pier caps—each element contributing to the structural integrity of the flyover.

This project, titled Construction of 2-Lane ROB-Cum-Flyover from Pakka Pul to Daliganj and Bridge Across River Gomti in Lucknow, is a vital urban intervention aimed at easing congestion and enhancing connectivity across one of the city's busiest corridors. With a total length of 2.076 km including approaches, it stands as a testament to engineering excellence and meticulous execution.

The inaugurated stretch—from Rotary-1 to Rotary-2—spanning 839 meters is completed and operational. This segment is expected to significantly streamline traffic movement, offering commuters a smoother and faster passage through the area.

Behind this achievement lies a story of precision, scale, and dedication. The completed works include 343 piles, 70 pile caps, 67 piers, 3 abutment walls, and 62 pier caps—each element contributing to the structural integrity of the flyover. The superstructure comprises 238 girders, including PSC, RCC, and composite girders, all successfully fabricated and erected.

As the dignitaries flagged off the newly completed stretch, the occasion symbolized more than just the opening of a flyover—it marked the realization of a vision to transform urban mobility in Lucknow. With the Rotary-1 to Rotary-2 stretch now open to the public, the LDA Flyover–Daliganj Project promises to redefine connectivity and bring lasting benefits to the city's residents.

# Healthcare Takes a Leap

## Silchar Medical College & Hospital Completed



In the lush Barak Valley of Assam, where heavy rains, floods, and geographic challenges often test the resilience of communities, healthcare infrastructure plays a vital role in saving lives. Recognizing the growing need for advanced emergency medical facilities in the region, the construction of a 500-bedded Emergency Hospital at Silchar Medical College & Hospital emerged as a landmark project—one that would strengthen healthcare access for thousands of people across southern Assam and neighbouring states.

Entrusted with this significant responsibility, NCC undertook the construction of the modern emergency hospital within the existing campus of Silchar Medical College & Hospital in Silchar. Spread across five blocks rising up to Ground plus four floors, the structure covers a ground footprint of 6,182 square metres and a total built-up area of 34,341 square metres.

### Building a Modern Emergency Care Facility

Constructing a hospital of this magnitude demanded meticulous engineering and planning. The project began with a strong structural foundation using BCIS piles of 400 mm diameter with a depth of 11 metres, ensuring the stability and durability of the building.

The civil works included extensive concrete structures and

AAC block masonry, chosen for its strength, insulation properties, and efficiency. The interiors were designed to meet the stringent requirements of modern healthcare environments. Safety and functionality were key considerations throughout the project. The hospital features fire-rated doors, wooden doors for general spaces, and aluminium doors and windows for durability and ease of maintenance.

One of the striking architectural elements of the facility is the external perforated façade, which not only adds to the visual appeal but also helps in ventilation and thermal performance—important in the humid climate of Assam. Stainless steel railings and landscaped horticulture works around the campus provide both safety and a welcoming environment for patients and visitors.

### Advanced Engineering Systems for Healthcare

Beyond the visible structure lies a sophisticated network of engineering systems essential for hospital operations.

The MEP (Mechanical, Electrical, and Plumbing) works included comprehensive plumbing and water supply systems, ensuring uninterrupted water availability across the facility. A robust firefighting system was installed to safeguard the building and its occupants.

The electrical infrastructure includes a dedicated electrical

substation, supported by DG sets for uninterrupted power supply—an essential requirement for critical medical equipment. Modern HVAC systems maintain controlled temperature and air quality across operation theatres and patient care areas.

To support efficient hospital movement, three bed lifts were installed, enabling the swift transfer of patients between floors during emergencies.

Specialized medical infrastructure forms the backbone of the facility. The hospital is equipped with a Medical Gas Pipeline System that supplies oxygen and other gases directly to patient beds and operation theatres. Dedicated operation theatre facilities, along with essential support systems such as STP (Sewage Treatment Plant), ETP (Effluent Treatment Plant), and Underground Water Tanks, ensure that the hospital operates sustainably and efficiently.

## Strengthening Healthcare for the Region

The completion of the 500-bedded Emergency Hospital at Silchar Medical College & Hospital represents far more than a construction achievement. It stands as a critical healthcare lifeline for the region, enhancing the ability of medical professionals to respond swiftly to emergencies and provide quality care to patients.

For NCC, the project reflects its commitment to building infrastructure that directly impacts lives. By delivering a modern emergency healthcare facility in Silchar, the company has contributed to strengthening the medical backbone of Assam and ensuring that advanced treatment is accessible to communities in the region.

Construction equipment plays a crucial role in delivering excellence across ongoing and future projects, and this commitment to innovation is clearly reflected in the latest developments at site. The WWTF Malad Project has marked a significant milestone with the successful commissioning of the SANY 71-meter Truck-Mounted Concrete Boom Placer, reinforcing NCC's commitment to adopting advanced construction technologies.

This state-of-the-art equipment—one of the largest concrete boom placers in India and South Asia—has been inducted under the visionary guidance of ASN Raju, Wholetime Director, marking a major leap in enhancing execution capabilities for complex and large-scale projects.

The machine was inspected as a fully assembled unit at the manufacturer's facility in China through a live Teams session and was received at site without any deviations. It was subsequently tested and successfully commissioned at the WWTF-Malad Project.

## Strong Performance at First Operation

Demonstrating its exceptional capability, the boom placer successfully executed a major concrete pour of 404 cubic meters (out of 800 cubic meters) within 8.5 hours during its very first operation.

## Key Significance

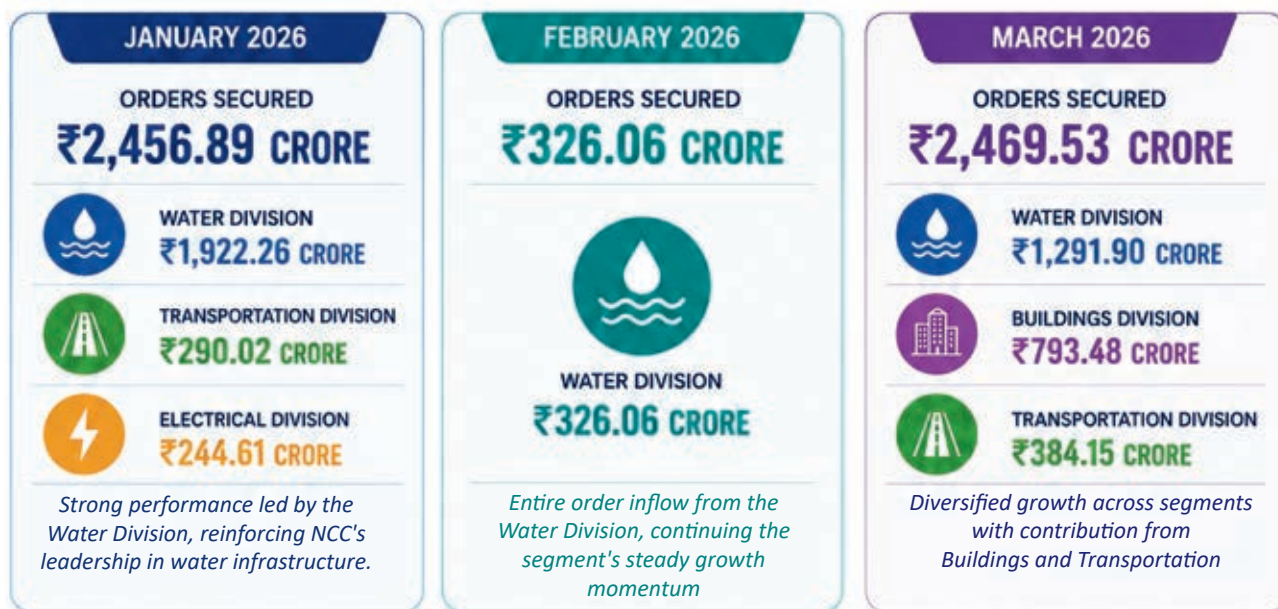

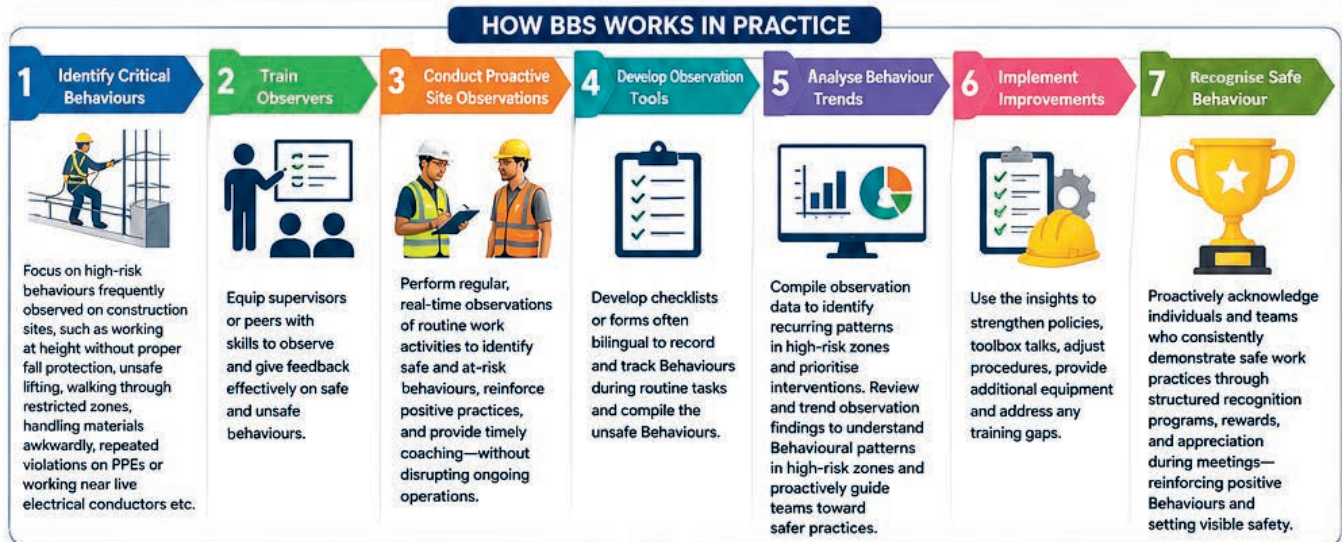
# Behaviour-Based Safety

## Meet-Ups: A Mission Approved by ISRO Only

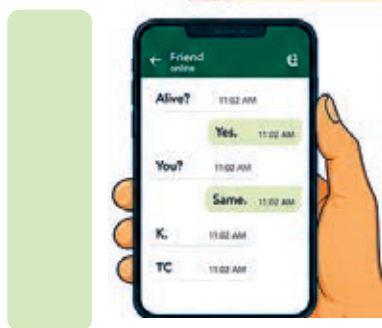

## The Rise of Micro-Connections Because Who Has Time for Full Sentences?

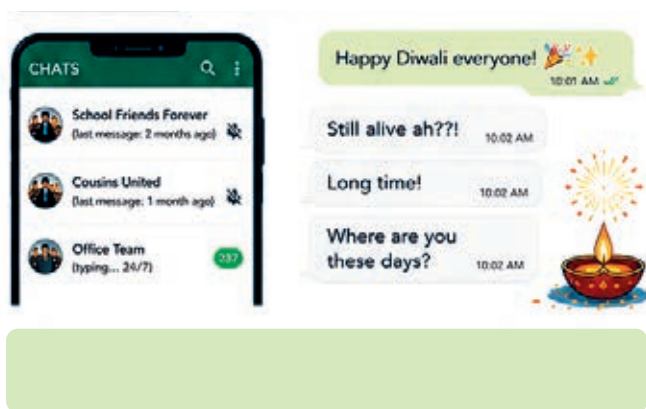
Conversations today look like this:

## WhatsApp Groups: The Digital Joint Family

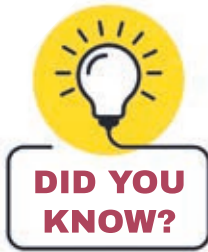

# The Story Behind Your Favourite Slice

**P**izza, one of the world's most loved foods, has a history as rich and layered as its toppings. Its origins can be traced back to Naples, where in the late 18th century, simple flatbreads topped with tomatoes and herbs became a popular, affordable meal for the working class.

One of the earliest and most iconic versions—the Margherita pizza—is believed to have been created on June 11, 1889, by Naples pizza maker Raffaele Esposito in honour of Queen Margherita of Savoy. With toppings of tomato, mozzarella, and basil, it reflected the colours of the Italian flag—an elegant example of food symbolising culture and identity.

Over time, pizza travelled across continents, evolving with local tastes and cultures. In India, modern pizza made its formal entry in 1996 with the arrival of Domino's Pizza, soon followed by other international brands such as Pizza Hut and Papa John's. Since then,

it has grown into a popular choice for celebrations, office gatherings, and family occasions.

Interestingly, India is not just a consumer of pizza—it is also connected to the very origins of some of its key ingredients. Take basil, for instance. Today, it is a defining element of Italian cuisine and a familiar topping on pizzas worldwide. However, basil has been revered in India for thousands of years and was widely used here long before it gained popularity in Europe.

Similarly, mozzarella cheese, now synonymous with pizza, has roots linked to India. It is traditionally made from the milk of the Water Buffalo, the animal that is believed to have originated in the Indian subcontinent before being introduced to Europe. These connections highlight how India has quietly contributed to the global culinary story of pizza—through agriculture, ingredients, and tradition.

# THE GOAL

by Eliyahu M Goldratt

**THE** Goal by Eliyahu M Goldratt stands out as one of the most influential management books I have read, primarily because it presents a powerful operational philosophy through a simple yet engaging narrative. Unlike traditional business literature that relies heavily on theory, Goldratt uses storytelling to make complex concepts both accessible and practical.

The book follows the journey of Alex Rogo, a plant manager tasked with turning around an underperforming manufacturing facility within a tight deadline. What makes the narrative compelling is not just the business challenge, but the way it mirrors real-world managerial dilemmas—conflicting priorities, pressure for short-term results, and the struggle to align teams. Through Alex's interactions with his mentor, Jonah, the reader is gradually introduced to the Theory of Constraints (TOC), which forms the backbone of the book.

One of the most striking insights for me was the redefinition of the fundamental goal of a business: to make money now and in the future. While this may appear simplistic, the book effectively demonstrates how most organisations lose sight of this objective by focusing excessively on local efficiencies, cost control, or traditional performance metrics. Goldratt challenges these conventions by introducing three critical measures—throughput, inventory, and operating expense—which together provide a far more meaningful view of organisational performance.

The concept of constraints or bottlenecks is central to the book's thesis. The idea that the performance of any system is governed by its weakest link is both intuitive and transformative. What resonated strongly with me is the disciplined approach suggested to manage

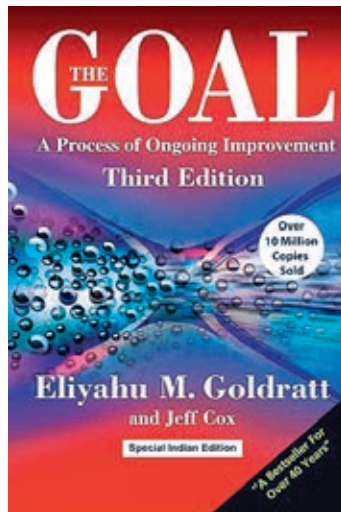
these constraints through the five focusing steps: identify, exploit, subordinate, elevate, and repeat. This structured thinking provides a practical roadmap for continuous improvement and decision-making.

Another important takeaway is the shift from maximising resource utilisation to optimising overall system flow. The book convincingly argues that keeping all resources busy does not necessarily improve outcomes; in fact, it can lead to inefficiencies such as excess inventory and longer lead times. This insight is particularly relevant in today's complex organisational environments, where interdependencies and variability often distort performance.

From a leadership perspective, The Goal reinforces the importance of systems thinking. It encourages managers to move beyond siloed decision-making and focus on what truly drives organisational success. The emphasis on questioning established practices and aligning all activities with the overarching goal is a lesson that extends well beyond manufacturing into areas such as services, project management, and enterprise risk management.

In conclusion, The Goal is more than just a book on operations management—it is a mindset shift. It challenges deeply held assumptions and provides a clear, actionable framework for improving organisational performance. In my view, it is essential reading for anyone in a leadership or managerial role who seeks to drive meaningful and sustained results.

Overall, the enduring message is this: optimising isolated parts of a system is far less important than optimising the system as a whole.

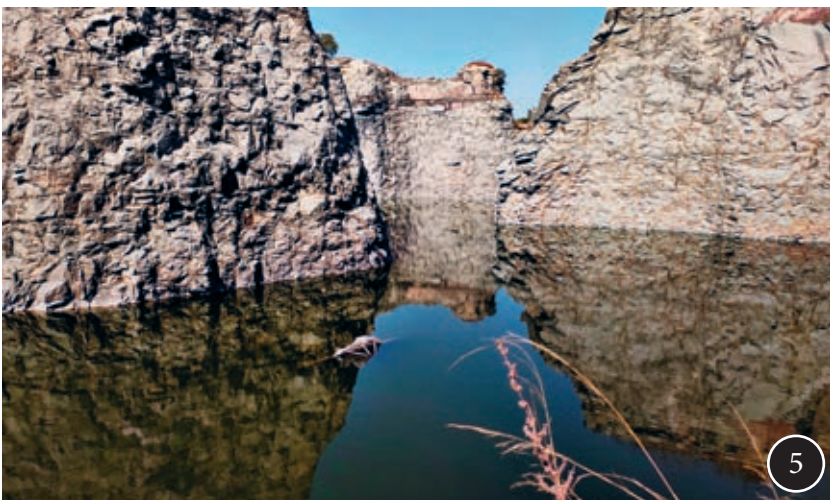

## The Lotus Building, Wujin, China

The Lotus Building in Wujin, China is a striking example of biomimicry in modern architecture, designed to resemble three blooming lotus flowers rising elegantly from an artificial lake. Engineered by the Australian firm Studio 505, the structure uses a steel space-frame system clad in petal-like panels that create both aesthetic beauty and structural efficiency, while its geothermal heating and cooling system—drawing energy from the lake beneath—demonstrates sustainable innovation. Housing parts of the city's planning and exhibition centre, the building not only symbolizes purity and growth (as the lotus does in Asian culture) but also showcases how advanced engineering, environmental consciousness, and artistic design can seamlessly merge into a functional civic landmark.
